a. Ordinance 16-04, Second Reading, Publication

Councilmember Hargis made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Cole to approve Ordinance 16-04, second reading, An Ordinance implementing the Town of Hudson Home Rule Charter by repealing and reenacting Section 2-9 of the Town of Hudson Municipal Code regarding publication.

b. Discussion – Verizon Cell Tower proposal

Rachael Long, representative from Rutherford, Inc., a consulting firm representing Verizon Wireless, presented a power-point presentation explaining the site selection procedure and a brief overview of placement and possible uses of the cell tower. Verizon has offered to pay the Town \$12,000 per year with a 5-year lease that is renewable 4 times, for a location in the Memorial Park.

The Council direction was to have staff continue negotiation with Verizon for a tower and try to negotiate a termination clause. The tower placement should meet future park development plans.

c. Ordinance 16-05, First Reading, An Ordinance Amending the Hudson Municipal Code by the addition thereto of a new Section 16-49 entitle Naming of Municipal Streets

Joe Racine, Town Manager, reported that according to CDOT as long as the Town of Hudson has something in the Municipal Code authorizing the process, the Town can change the name of Town streets. The proposed ordinance provides a process in the municipal code by which the Council can name a public street within the Town by resolution or by plat.

Councilmember Hargis made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Stell to approve Ordinance 16-05, First Reading, An Ordinance amending the Hudson Municipal Code by the addition thereto of a new Section 16-49 entitled Naming of Municipal Streets.

Joe Racine, Town Manager, reported that the proposed Pioneer Annexation will be a discussion item at the next Regular Meeting.

Corey Hoffmann, Town Attorney, reported that a trial date for the Library Litigation has been scheduled for October 3, 2016. Weld County and High Plains Library have agreed to meet in mitigation to resolve without going to trial.

Joe Racine, Town Manager, reported KBN Engineering estimated that the approximate cost to reshape the Eastridge ditch to the engineered 1996 drainage plan would cost \$12-\$15,000. The ditch would only convey drainage without detention. The cost to build a detention pond and obtain easements could be \$25-\$50,000.

The Hudson Town Council consensus was to have KBN Engineering do a cost estimate for the ditch, detention and engineering design and assume the pond location.

The Hudson Town Council agreed to sign a Letter of Support for Roggen Telephone for a Colorado Broadband Fund Grant application.

In 2007 the Board of Trustees named the section of Highway 52 west of I-76 that was within the Town as "Bison Highway." Love's has been using the address of 201 East Bison Highway ever since. With the construction of the pizza restaurant and the motel, the issue of the addressing on Bison Highway is again an issue. Staff discussed this matter with CDOT and found that additional action is needed to recognize a local street name designation on a state highway, that being adoption of a street naming ordinance. The current municipal code does not have such a provision.

CDOT has advised us that we can "change" the name of Highway 52 from "Main Street" to something else (Bison Highway) if we have a provision in our municipal code. There are other annexed road segments that have not been formally named by the Council.

Ordinance No. 16-05 provides a process in the municipal code by which the Council can name a public street within the Town by resolution or by plat. If passed, we can schedule a resolution by which the Council can formally assign street names.

Roy Fronczyk prepared the attached map of road segments that the Council might consider naming in this process. Current naming conventions for east-west "avenues" to be numbered, and north-south "streets" to have tree names in an alphabetical progression. There will need to be a discussion of what to do when we go outside the bounds of that system, namely going south of the "zero" line for avenue numbering and east of the alphabet for the tree names when naming the annexed segment of CR51.

The Council passed the ordinance on first reading on June 1st. If passed on second reading at this meeting we will schedule a resolution that will name selected streets on a future meeting agenda.

**TITLE: AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE HUDSON MUNICIPAL CODE
BY THE ADDITION THERETO OF A NEW SECTION 16-49
ENTITLED NAMING OF MUNICIPAL STREETS**

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF HUDSON, COLORADO:

Section 1. The Hudson Municipal Code is amended by the addition thereto of a new Section 16-49 to read as follows:

Sec. 16-49. Naming of municipal streets.

The Town Council is authorized to name public streets within the Town by Resolution or by plat.

Section 2. Safety Clause. The Town Council hereby finds, determines, and declares that this ordinance is promulgated under the general police power of the Town of Hudson, that it is promulgated for the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and that this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of health and safety and for the protection of public convenience and welfare. The Council further determines that the ordinance bears a rational relation to the proper legislative object sought to be attained.

Section 3. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, or part of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction invalid, such judgment shall not affect application to other persons or circumstances.

Section 4. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after final publication by title only.



At Weld County's request, the Town engaged in negotiations for another intergovernmental agreement (IGA) regarding the proposed widening of County Road 49. The Town, along with the County, Keenesburg and Kersey, approved an agreement regarding the roadway in October, 2015. The County subsequently decided that the 2015 agreement was insufficient to protect their investment and asked for additional concessions.

Attached is Resolution No. 16-13, approving a new two-party agreement, this time just between Hudson and Weld County. In summary, the new agreement does the following:

1. Acknowledges that a new law was passed in the last legislature regarding the County's ability to designate a county "primary road" in the unincorporated county and within incorporated towns with the town's approval of an IGA.
2. Acknowledges that a portion (1 mile) of CR49 was previously annexed by Hudson (the "Hudson Stretch).
3. Acknowledges that the Hudson Stretch "is a municipal street and a component of the Town's major street system and plan," and that the Town "retains jurisdiction" over the roadway after it's widened.
4. Acknowledges that the parties have adopted the WCR49 Access Control Plan, and have approved the 2015 IGA, which is incorporated into the new agreement.
5. Agrees that the road widening project can include the Hudson Stretch.
6. The Town agrees that the "nature and purpose" of the widened road is as a "four-lane controlled-access high-speed highway," and that the Town won't inhibit that function.
7. The County will pay for the widening and for repairs and installation of traffic control signage.
8. The Town will ensure that improvements needed to serve adjoining development in the Town will include necessary improvements at no cost to the County.
9. The Town will be responsible for snow removal and sweeping. The County will only do this work at the Town's request "in the event that the Town is unable to do so." The Town will pay for any damage it does to the roadway during snow removal and sweeping.
10. The County will petition for annexation of any right-of-way it has acquired that adjoins the Hudson Stretch within 60 days of the roadway being opened to traffic.

11. The Town agrees not to annex any additional sections of CR49 to the north prior to the effective date of the new state law. (In this way any additional sections that are annexed would be subject to the law.)
12. Hudson will be the permitting authority for access along the Hudson Stretch.
13. Traffic control on the Hudson Stretch must comply to the original IGA, the Hudson Municipal Code (including the Model Traffic Code), and the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD).
14. Speed limits will be 65 MPH unless lower speeds are warranted under the original IGA, the Model Traffic Code and the MUTCD.
15. There is no unilateral termination provision in this agreement.

The Commissioners have indicated that they will consider this version of the agreement on Monday, June 13th.

WHEREAS, the Town of Hudson and Weld County have prepared a two party intergovernmental agreement, the INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR THE EXTENSION OF THE WCR 49 FOUR-LANE CONTROLLED-ACCESS HIGHWAY THROUGH THE TOWN OF HUDSON, COLORADO acknowledging the WCR49 IGA and designating the portion of Weld County Road 49 (between WCR 18 and I-76; referred to as the “Hudson Stretch”) that is within the corporate boundaries of Town of Hudson and providing additional agreement terms, attached as Exhibit A.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF HUDSON, COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR THE EXTENSION OF THE WCR 49 FOUR-LANE CONTROLLED-ACCESS HIGHWAY THROUGH THE TOWN OF HUDSON, COLORADO is hereby approved, and the Mayor and Town Clerk are authorized and directed to execute the same.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR THE EXTENSION OF THE WCR 49 FOUR-LANE CONTROLLED-ACCESS HIGHWAY THROUGH THE TOWN OF HUDSON, COLORADO

THIS INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT is entered into this ____ day of _____, 2016, by and between the Town of Hudson, a home rule municipality of the State of Colorado, whose address is 557 Ash Street, P.O. Box 351, Hudson, Colorado 80642-0351, hereinafter referred to as "Hudson," and the County of Weld, a political subdivision of the State of Colorado, by and through the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Weld, whose address is 1150 O Street, P.O. Box 758, Greeley, Colorado 80632, hereinafter referred to as "County." The parties hereto may also be referred to herein collectively as "the Parties."

WITNESSETH:

RECITALS

WHEREAS, H.B. 15-1155 ("HB 1155") was passed by the Colorado General Assembly and signed by Governor Hickenlooper, with an effective date of August 10, 2016; and

WHEREAS, HB 1155 adds C.R.S. § 43-2-110(1.5), which authorizes counties to designate as a primary road any four-lane controlled-access county highway, the construction of which commences in 2016, that is located within the unincorporated area of the county and that intersects with an interstate highway or a United States numbered highway; and

WHEREAS, for those portions of a designated four-lane controlled-access county highway that were annexed by a municipality prior to the designation by the county, C.R.S. § 43-2-110(1.5)(m) authorizes the municipality and county to enter into an intergovernmental agreement to define the jurisdiction, responsibilities, and duties of the municipality and the county with respect to such portion of the highway as it continues through the municipality; and

WHEREAS, such intergovernmental agreements are authorized by C.R.S. § 29-1-203 and Colorado Constitution Article XIV, § 18(2)(a); and

WHEREAS, County has planned, designed, and intends to construct Weld County Road ("WCR") 49 as a four-lane controlled-access high-speed highway, to be designated on August 10, 2016, in the unincorporated area of Weld County as a Primary Road, pursuant to C.R.S. § 43-2-110(1.5), with said construction to commence in 2016 and WCR 49 intersecting with U.S. Highway 34 and I-76 (referred to herein as the "WCR 49 Highway"); and

WHEREAS, a portion of WCR 49 (between WCR 18 and I-76; referred to herein as the "Hudson Stretch") was previously annexed by Hudson; and

WHEREAS, Hudson desires to cooperate and coordinate with County to extend the WCR 49 Highway over the Hudson Stretch so as to intersect with I-76; however, the Parties also confirm by this Agreement that the Hudson Stretch is a municipal street and a component of the Town's major street system and plan pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-23-217; and

WHEREAS, Hudson and County have each adopted the WCR 49 Access Control Plan, dated December 14, 2014 (referred to herein as, "WCR 49 ACP"), which includes a set of goals and objectives, and recommendations regarding traffic signals, future comprehensive planning, school bus stops, access change of use, access to the WCR 49 corridor, load limiting of WCR 49, WCR corridor redevelopment, road cut policy, a WCR 49 corridor intergovernmental agreement, and future access control plans; and

WHEREAS, for such extension of the WCR 49 Highway over the Hudson Stretch, as described and detailed by this IGA, County will pay the entire cost to construct and provide continuous maintenance of the Hudson Stretch without seeking reimbursement of such costs from Hudson (except as to the costs of construction and installation of the improvements described in Paragraph 5, below); and

WHEREAS, County and Hudson previously entered into the "WCR 49 Access Control Plan Intergovernmental Agreement among the Town of Hudson, the Town of Keenesburg, the Town of Kersey, and Weld County," dated October 19, 2015 (the "Original WCR 49 IGA"), which agrees to implement the WCR 49 ACP along the WCR 49 Highway; and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto desire to enter into this IGA for the purpose of agreeing to the extension of the WCR 49 Highway over the Hudson Stretch and, as authorized pursuant to C.R.S. § 43-2-110(1.5)(m), to define the jurisdiction, responsibilities, and duties of the Hudson and County with respect to the Hudson Stretch.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants stated herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. INCORPORATION OF RECITALS: The Parties hereby agree to and incorporate all of the recitals set forth above into this IGA.
2. EXTENSION OF THE WCR 49 HIGHWAY OVER THE HUDSON STRETCH: Hudson agrees to the extension of the WCR 49 Highway, including the proposed widening of the roadway to five lanes, over the Hudson Stretch, pursuant to the terms of this IGA. Such extension is without cost to Hudson.
3. RETENTION OF JURISDICTION BY HUDSON FOR THE HUDSON STRETCH: The Parties agree that Hudson retains jurisdiction of the Hudson Stretch as a municipal street within Hudson after such widening and improvement; however,

Hudson agrees and acknowledges that the nature and purpose of the WCR 49 Highway is a as four-lane controlled-access high-speed highway consistent with the Original WCR 49 IGA. Hudson will take no actions that will inhibit such nature and purpose except as may occur in concert with County in accordance with the terms of this IGA.

4. CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF HUDSON SRETCH: County agrees to pay for the entire cost of the construction of the Hudson Stretch to the four-lane controlled access standard (except for the costs of construction and installation of the improvements described in Paragraph 5, below). The term “construction” shall include, but not be limited to, the acquisition of any needed additional right-of-way, title of which shall be held by Weld County as right-of-way. Weld County agrees to maintain the Hudson Stretch, as needed, in perpetuity, at the County’s sole cost, beginning upon the completion of said construction. The term “maintain” shall include only repair of the roadway surface, shoulders, and Jim’s Creek bridge rails and culverts, and the installation and replacement, if necessary, of all route markers, directional signs, and traffic control signals, signs and control devices consistent with the Original WCR 49 IGA.

5. DEVELOPERS ALONG HUDSON STRETCH TO PAY FOR NECESSARY IMPROVEMENTS CAUSED BY THEIR DEVELOPMENTS: The Parties agree that County will pay the entire cost to construct and provide continuous maintenance of the Hudson Stretch without seeking reimbursement of such costs from Hudson. The County shall not be responsible for the cost of any improvements within the Hudson Stretch caused by development within the Town that requires connection to the four-lane controlled-access highway, or additional traffic control measures, or auxiliary lanes that are made necessary because of increased or intensified traffic entering or exiting the WCR 49 Highway caused by such developments, in accordance with the requirements of the Original WCR 49 IGA and the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (the “MUTCD”). Hudson shall be responsible for ensuring in the course of its land use approval process that such improvements are paid for, which may take the form of payments from the developers, from metro districts, or from other funding mechanisms.

6. SNOW REMOVAL AND STREET SWEEPING ON HUDSON STRETCH: Hudson shall perform snow removal and street sweeping on the Hudson Stretch and shall as necessary and to the extent practicable coordinate such activities with County’s maintenance crews to assure that the County only performs snow removal and street sweeping in the event the Town is unable to do so. Hudson agrees to pay for any damage to the road surface of the Hudson Stretch directly caused by Hudson performing snow removal or street sweeping. Hudson agrees that it alone shall be responsible for any third-party liability directly caused by its employees performing snow removal and/or street sweeping on the Hudson Stretch.

7. INCORPORATION OF ORIGINAL WCR 49 IGA: County and Hudson incorporate herein by this reference and restate the Original WCR 49 IGA consistent with C.R.S. § 43-2-110(1.5)(m) as it relates to the respective obligations of the County and Hudson, except that the County and Hudson expressly acknowledge that the termination provision in Section 14 the Original WCR 49 IGA shall no longer apply.
8. ANNEXATION OF RIGHT-OF-WAY "SLIVERS" ALONG HUDSON STRETCH: County has purchased additional rights-of-way on both sides of the Hudson Stretch. The Parties agree that annexation of all such rights-of-way into Hudson will assist law enforcement on the Hudson Stretch. County agrees to, within sixty (60) days of substantial completion of construction and the opening to traffic of the Hudson Stretch of the WCR 49 Highway, submit to Hudson a petition for annexation of such additional rights-of-way it has purchased on both sides of the Hudson Stretch. Upon annexation, the Parties agree Hudson shall have all access permitting authority consistent with the Original WCR 49 IGA and the Hudson Municipal Code. Hudson agrees that access permitting procedures, terms and standards set forth in the Hudson Municipal Code which are not commensurate with the procedures, terms and standards set forth in the Original WCR 49 IGA, shall not apply to the Hudson Stretch.
9. ANNEXATION OF WCR 49 LYING NORTH OF THE HUDSON STRETCH: Hudson agrees not to approve prior to August 10, 2016 any annexation petitions submitted to annex portion(s) of WCR 49 lying to the north of the Hudson Stretch.
10. INSTALLATION, OPERATION, AND MAINTENANCE OF TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS, SIGNS AND TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES ON HUDSON STRETCH: County and Hudson agree that on the Hudson Stretch, the installation, operation, and maintenance of traffic control signals, signs and traffic control devices on the Hudson Stretch shall comply with the requirements of the Original WCR 49 IGA, the Hudson Municipal Code, and the MUTCD. Hudson agrees that procedures, terms and standards set forth in the Hudson Municipal Code that apply to traffic control signals, signs and traffic control devices and which are not commensurate with the procedures, terms and standards set forth in the Original WCR 49 IGA and the MUTCD, shall not apply to the Hudson Stretch. Speed limits along the Hudson Stretch shall be a standard 65 miles-per-hour, unless lower speeds are warranted pursuant to the provisions of the Original WCR 49 IGA, the Model Traffic Code, and the MUTCD. No load limits will be imposed along the Hudson Stretch without the consent of the County. The entire cost of the installation, operation, and maintenance of traffic control signals, signs and traffic control devices on the Hudson Stretch shall be paid for by County (except for the costs of construction and installation of the improvements described in Paragraph 5, above).
11. ACCESS TO THE HUDSON STRETCH: Access to the Hudson Stretch shall be

determined between Hudson and County in accordance with the terms set forth in the Original WCR 49 IGA. Hudson has previously approved in its Comprehensive Plan a major street intersection at or near 25th Avenue and WCR 49. The Parties agree that the terms of the Original WCR 49 IGA shall apply to the determination of access at that location.

12. SEVERABILITY: If any term or condition of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, this Agreement shall be construed and enforced without such provision to the extent that this Agreement is then capable of execution within the original intent of the parties hereto.
13. NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY ENFORCEMENT: It is expressly understood and agreed that the enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and all rights of action relating to such enforcement, shall be strictly reserved to the undersigned parties and nothing in this Agreement shall give or allow any claim or right of action whatsoever by any other person not included in this Agreement. It is the express intention of the undersigned parties that any entity other than the undersigned parties receiving services or benefits under this Agreement shall be an incidental beneficiary only.
14. MODIFICATION AND BREACH: This Agreement contains the entire agreement and understanding between the parties to this Agreement and supersedes any other agreements concerning the subject matter of this transaction, whether oral or written, including the agreement entitled, "WCR 49 Access Control Plan Intergovernmental Agreement Among the Town of Hudson, the Town of Keenesburg, the Town of Kersey, and Weld County." No modification, amendment, novation, renewal, or other alteration of or to this Agreement shall be deemed valid or of any force or effect whatsoever, unless mutually agreed upon in writing by the undersigned parties. No breach of any term, provision, or clause of this Agreement shall be deemed waived or excused, unless such waiver or consent shall be in writing and signed by the party claimed to have waived or consented. Any consent by any party hereto, or waiver of, a breach by any other party, whether express or implied, shall not constitute a consent to, waiver of, or excuse for any other different or subsequent breach.

Subject: Adoption of procedure to comply with Senate Bill 15-058 – Eyewitness Identification.

This procedure was supplied by the Colorado District Attorneys Council.

I will be at the meeting to answer any questions you may have.

Policy 605 – Eyewitness Identification

605.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide members of the Hudson Marshals Office with guidelines for dealing with photo lineups, live lineups, and show-ups that are conducted in the field.

605.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include:

Eyewitness – a person who observed another person at or near the scene of an offense

Filler – a person or photograph of a person who is not suspected of the offense in question and is included in an identification procedure

Show-up – an identification procedure in which an eyewitness is presented with a single suspect in person to determine if the eyewitness identifies the suspect as the perpetrator of an offense

Photo Array (Photo Lineup) – an identification procedure in which a group of photographs including a photo of the suspected perpetrator of an offense and photos of additional fillers, is shown to an eyewitness to determine if the eyewitness identifies the suspect as the perpetrator. The photographs may be displayed in either hard copy form or via electronic means.

Live Lineup – a live identification procedure in which a group of people including the suspected perpetrator of an offense and additional fillers, is shown to an eyewitness to determine if the eyewitness identifies the suspect as the perpetrator.

Administrator – the person who is conducting an identification procedure

Blind administrator – the administrator of an identification procedure who does not know the identity of the suspect when it is viewed by the eyewitness

Blinded administrator – the administrator of an identification procedure who may know who the suspect is, but does not know in which position the suspect is placed in a photo array.

Confidence statement – a statement by an eyewitness immediately following an identification regarding his or her confidence in the identification's accuracy

605.2 PHOTO ARRAY (PHOTO LINEUP)

605.2.1 CREATING THE PHOTO ARRAY

Instructions to the marshal creating the photo array:

- 1) Fillers should be similar in appearance to the suspect and to the eyewitness' original description of the suspect. Similarities should include gender, age, race, height, hair color, facial hair, clothing and distinctive physical features.
- 2) At least five fillers should be included in each photo array, in addition to the suspect. Administrators should not include fillers who are known to the eyewitness.
- 3) Only one suspect should be included in a photo array. If there is more than one suspect in an investigation, a separate photo array should be made for each suspect. Different fillers should be used in the separate arrays.

- 4) Photos used in an array should be of consistent size, quality, color and background. Photos should not contain stray markings or information about the subject. Any marking or identifying information should be covered. If one photo in the array is covered in any manner, all the photos should be similarly covered.

605.2.2 COMMUNICATING WITH THE EYEWITNESS

Instructions for the marshal communicating with the eyewitness:

- 1) When contacting an eyewitness to arrange for viewing a photo array, the marshal should advise only that he/she intends to conduct a photo identification procedure.
- 2) Avoid addressing whether a person is in custody or whether other supporting evidence about the suspect has been obtained (such as statements, physical evidence, and other identifications).
- 3) When an eyewitness arrives to view the array, he/she should be prevented from speaking to any other eyewitnesses about the identification procedure.
- 4) The administrator should provide the following or substantially similar instructions to an eyewitness before displaying a photo array:
 - a) The eyewitness is being asked to view a photo array as part of an ongoing investigation into a crime that occurred on (date) at (location), to see if the eyewitness recognizes anyone involved with the crime.
 - b) The eyewitness should not assume the administrator knows who the suspect is, or seek assistance from the administrator or anyone else present in making an identification.
 - c) The suspect may or may not be pictured in the array.
 - d) Individuals pictured in the photo array may not look exactly as they did on the date of the incident. Some features-like hairstyle or facial hair-are subject to change.
 - e) Photos do not necessarily depict the true complexion of a person; it may be darker or lighter than appears in the photo.
 - f) The eyewitness should pay no attention to any markings on the photos or any differences in the style/type of the photos.
 - g) If the eyewitness makes an identification, the eyewitness will be asked about his/her level of certainty. The administrator will ask the eyewitness to choose whether he/she is confident, somewhat confident or not confident about his/her identification.
 - h) The investigation will continue, regardless of whether the eyewitness makes an identification.

605.2.3 ADMINISTERING THE PHOTO ARRAY

The following or substantially similar steps should be taken in administering the photo array:

- 1) When practicable, a blind administrator is recommended for all photo arrays (an administrator who does not know the identity of the suspect).
- 2) When use of a blind administrator is impractical, blinded administration of the phot array should be used (the administrator knows the identity of the suspect, but not what position the suspect occupies in the array).
- 3) Examples of methods for blinded administration may include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a) The photo array is created by an officer other than the administrator and then placed in a folder. The administrator gives the folder to the eyewitness, who looks at the array within the folder, so that the administrator cannot see the photos during the identification.

- b) The administrator makes multiple arrays, placing the suspect's photo in different positions in each. The same fillers may be used in the multiple arrays. The arrays are then placed in separate, closed folders and the witness selects which one to view. The eyewitness looks at the array within the folder, so that the administrator cannot see the photos while the eyewitness is viewing them.
- 4) During all photo array procedures, the administrator should stand out of the eyewitness' line of sight during the viewing of the array, but in a position where he/she can observe and hear the eyewitness.
- 5) If multiple eyewitnesses are viewing a photo array, they should be prevented from speaking to one another about the identification procedure. Each eyewitness must view the array separately and be admonished not to discuss the identification procedure with any other eyewitness.
- 6) The administrator should always remain neutral during the identification procedure, so as not to suggest a particular photo to the eyewitness.
- 7) If both practicable and available, administrators are encouraged to video record the photo array procedure and confidence statement. Audio recording is an acceptable alternative if video recording is not practicable.
- 8) After viewing the array, the administrator should ask the eyewitness the following questions. If the eyewitness' answers are unclear, the administrator should ask the eyewitness what he/she meant by the answers.
 - a) Do you recognize anyone?
 - b) If so, what number do you recognize?
 - c) From where do you recognize this person?
- 9) If the eyewitness makes an identification, in addition to recording or memorializing any spontaneous statements made by the eyewitness, the eyewitness should be asked about his/her level of certainty. The administrator should ask the eyewitness to choose which of the following statements best describes his/her level of certainty in the identification:
 - a) I am confident that is the person I saw.
 - b) I am somewhat confident that is the person I saw.
 - c) I am not confident at all that is the person I saw.
- 10) The administrator should not comment, nod or make gestures (either positive or negative) on whether the eyewitness picked the suspect. If asked by the eyewitness, the administrator should explain he/she is not allowed to provide feedback.
- 11) Once the procedure is concluded and fully documented (see below), the administrator can talk to the eyewitness about the next steps in the case. The eyewitness should be instructed not to discuss the identification procedure with other eyewitnesses. Also, the administrator should not discuss any other identification procedures viewed by other eyewitnesses.

605.2.4 DOCUMENTING THE PHOTO ARRAY

Administrators should document the following or substantially similar information using appropriate forms or notes:

- 1) Where the procedure took place, who was present, the date and time it was administered.
- 2) Any statements, comments or physical reactions of the eyewitness while viewing the array.
- 3) Each eyewitness should complete a standard form that records their identifying information and the results of the procedure after viewing the array. The eyewitness should sign and date the array itself, or a copy supplied to document the identification procedure.

- 4) The eyewitness' confidence statement, including any spontaneous statements, should be documented word for word.
- 5) Preserve the photo array in the original form that was shown to each eyewitness. A copy of the photo array should be included with the case report.

605.3 LIVE LINEUPS

Consultation with the appropriate prosecuting attorney's office is recommended whenever a live lineup is being considered.

605.3.1 CREATING THE LIVE LINEUP

Instructions to the marshal creating the live lineup:

- 1) Fillers should be similar in appearance to the suspect and to the eyewitness' original description of the suspect. Similarities should include gender, age, race, height, hair color, facial hair, clothing and distinctive physical features.
- 2) At least five fillers should be included in each live lineup, in addition to the suspect. In no case, should less than four fillers be used. Only one suspect should appear per live lineup. Administrators should not include fillers who are known to the eyewitness.
- 3) If necessary, all members of the live lineup should be seated to minimize any height differences.
- 4) If there is more than one suspect, different fillers should be used in each live lineup.
- 5) The suspect should be allowed to select his/her own position in the live lineup. Where the suspect was previously identified in a photo array, that number should be avoided unless insisted upon by the suspect.
- 6) All members of the live lineup should be instructed not to speak or gesture to one another during the procedure. All members of the live lineup should be instructed to remain still and look forward unless otherwise directed by an officer/investigator.

605.3.2 COMMUNICATING WITH THE EYEWITNESS

Instructions for the marshal communicating with the eyewitness:

- 1) When contacting an eyewitness to arrange for viewing a live lineup, the marshal should advise only that he/she intends to conduct an identification procedure.
- 2) Avoid addressing whether a person is in custody or whether other supporting evidence about the suspect has been obtained (such as statements, physical evidence, and other identifications).
- 3) When an eyewitness arrives to view the live lineup, he/she should be prevented from speaking to any other eyewitnesses about the identification procedure.
- 4) The administrator should provide the following or substantially similar instructions to an eyewitness before viewing a live lineup:
 - a) The eyewitness is being asked to view a lineup as part of an ongoing investigation into a crime that occurred on (date) at (location), to see if the eyewitness recognizes anyone involved with the crime.
 - b) The eyewitness should not assume the administrator knows who the suspect is, or seek assistance from the administrator or anyone else present in making an identification.
 - c) The suspect may or may not be present in the lineup
 - d) Individuals presented in the lineup may not look exactly as they did on the date of the incident. Some features-like hairstyle or facial hair-are subject to change.

- e) The eyewitness can ask the administering officer to have the lineup members move, speak or change clothing. If one lineup member is asked, all the members will be asked to do the same.
- f) If the eyewitness makes an identification, the eyewitness will be asked about his/her level of certainty. The administrator will ask the eyewitness to choose whether he/she is confident, somewhat confident or not confident about his/her identification.
- g) The investigation will continue, regardless of whether the eyewitness makes an identification.

605.3.3 ADMINISTERING THE LIVE LINEUP

- 1) A blind administrator is recommended for all live lineups (an administrator who does not know the identity of the suspect).
- 2) After the administrator instructs the eyewitness, he/she should stand outside the eyewitness' line of sight, while still being in position to observe and hear the eyewitness.
- 3) If there are multiple eyewitnesses, they must each view the lineup separately. The position of the suspect should be moved each time the lineup is shown to a different eyewitness. Eyewitnesses should be prevented from speaking to each other about the identification procedure.
- 4) The marshal monitoring the suspect and fillers in the lineup room should remain out of view of the eyewitness to avoid any claims of inadvertent suggestion.
- 5) If both practicable and available, administrators are encouraged to video record the live lineup procedure and confidence statement. Audio recording is an acceptable alternative if video recording is not practicable. If the procedure is not video recorded, the lineup should be preserved by photographs.
- 6) After an eyewitness views the lineup, the administrator should ask him/her the following questions. If the eyewitness' answers are unclear, the administrator should ask the eyewitness what he/she meant by the answers.
 - a) Do you recognize anyone?
 - b) If so, what number do you recognize?
 - c) From where do you recognize this person?
- 7) If the eyewitness makes an identification, in addition to recording or memorializing any spontaneous statements made by the eyewitness, the eyewitness should be asked about his/her level of certainty. The administrator should ask the eyewitness to choose which of the following statements best describes his/her level of certainty in the identification:
 - a) I am confident that is the person I saw.
 - b) I am somewhat confident that is the person I saw.
 - c) I am not confident at all that is the person I saw.
- 8) The administrator should not comment, nod or make gestures (either positive or negative) on whether the eyewitness picked the suspect. If asked by the eyewitness, the administrator should explain he/she is not allowed to provide feedback.
- 9) There are circumstances where a suspect may have an attorney present during a live lineup. Consult with the appropriate prosecuting attorney's office for guidance regarding a suspect's right to counsel. When in attendance, a defense attorney should be instructed not to speak in the viewing room when the eyewitness is present.

- 5) When there are multiple eyewitnesses for a showup procedure, they should each be transported to view the suspect in separate vehicles. Eyewitnesses should be prevented from speaking to each other about the identification procedure. When the procedure is over, eyewitnesses should be admonished not to discuss the identification procedure with any other eyewitnesses.
- 6) When there are multiple suspects detained, the suspects should be distanced from each other sufficiently so that the eyewitness views each suspect one at a time.
- 7) Whenever practicable, the suspect should not be handcuffed or in a patrol vehicle at the time of the showup.
- 8) Video recording of showup procedures is recommended using dashboard cameras, body-worn cameras or other available recording devices. When video recording is not practicable, audio recording is an acceptable alternative.
- 9) The administrator should not comment, nod or make gestures (either positive or negative) about the eyewitness' identification of the suspect.
- 10) The administrator of a showup identification should document the procedure using appropriate forms and/or notes to record the following or substantially similar information:
 - a) The name and identifying information of the eyewitness.
 - b) Where the procedure took place, who was present, the date and time it was administered.
 - c) The circumstances leading to the showup procedure.
 - d) Physical circumstances of the showup – including lighting, weather, approximate distance between the eyewitness and suspect, whether the suspect was handcuffed, physical description of the suspect and the length of time between the suspect's detention and the identification.
 - e) Any statements, comments or physical reactions of the eyewitness during the identification procedure.
 - f) The eyewitness' confidence statement, including any spontaneous statements, should be documented word for word.
 - g) Each eyewitness should complete a standard form about the results of the procedure after viewing the suspect.

Before you this evening is Resolution #16-14. This resolution if approved and adopted by the Hudson Town Council would make the Weld County 2016 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, the Town of Hudson's Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan

In July of 2015, a diverse group of county and municipal stakeholders came together to update the Weld County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. This was the first time Weld County had developed a Hazard Mitigation Plan on its own. The county was previously associated with the Northeast Colorado Hazard Mitigation Plan. The major goals of the planning effort were to re-evaluate local risk and vulnerability to hazards, to develop cross-jurisdictional partnerships and public outreach processes, and to develop a new, robust, county-specific hazard mitigation strategy.

Over the course of the next several months, Weld County's Office of Emergency Management (OEM), in coordination with other county departments and consultants from Michael Baker International, assumed the lead role in the development of the Weld County 2016 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. Weld OEM fostered participation with their municipal partners by prioritizing continuous contact via group meetings, emails, and phone calls. Weld OEM also met one-on-one with local jurisdictions to discuss the results of the risk assessment, to identify feasible mitigation actions, and to help with action prioritization. For the purposes of this discussion, our town surveyed the residents specific to this project in the 2015 Citizen Survey. The results of that survey were used to develop our town-specific Hazard Mitigation Action Guides.

Although the Town of Hudson is referenced several times throughout the 587 page Weld County 2016 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan document, the primary Community Profile and Hazard Mitigation Plans / Mitigation Action Guides specific to Hudson can be found in Appendix B of the main document, pages 440-455. I have also attached those specific pages to this memo. To review the Weld County 2016 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan document in its entirety, go to <http://www.co.weld.co.us/apps/oem/WeldCO2016HMPPFinal.pdf>.

Developing ongoing relationships and collaborations related to the Hazard Mitigation Plan remains a high priority for Weld County. Moving forward, the Weld County Hazard

Mitigation Planning Committee, of which we are a member, will build off of the relationships developed during the initial planning process and will continue to play an active role in annual plan reviews and resilience-building efforts.

For reference purposes, the State of Colorado, FEMA and several of the municipal partners have approved and adopted the Weld County 2016 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. Remaining jurisdictions have until July 5, 2016 to approve and adopt the plan. Staff recommends approval and adoption of the Weld County 2016 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan.





Vulnerability Assessment

This section provides a refined vulnerability assessment, specific for the Town of Hudson, for those hazards that were identified as being rated HIGH in the preceding section. This analysis was conducted separately from that of the county-wide vulnerability assessment to specifically focus on the population, structures, infrastructure, and other assets unique to the Town of Hudson.

The results of the social vulnerability assessment are displayed on the map below. On the map, social vulnerability is represented at the census tract level by 5 classes of vulnerability: Low (bottom 20% of the county), Medium-Low, Medium, Medium-High, and High (top 20% of the county). The Town of Hudson’s social vulnerability map shows social vulnerability within the community.





The Town of Hudson consists of areas that range from medium social vulnerability and medium-high social vulnerability. The medium-high socially vulnerable areas are in the north western part of the community. Resources and measures to reduce the social determinates of disasters may be most effectively allocated to the northwest area of the Town. Moreover, it is critical that the town analyze the individual social vulnerability indicators that make the northwestern part of the community stand out. Through ongoing evaluation, the Town of Hudson will be able to more effectively reduce local social vulnerability and increase their resilience to hazard events.

HAZMAT

Based on data supplied by the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration's (PHMSA) Incident Reports Database there have been no reported HAZMAT incidents within the Town of Hudson between 1972 and 2015.

Inventory Exposed

Interstate 76 runs through the Town of Hudson and is a designated nuclear and hazardous materials transportation route. All structures, natural resources, and people located within one mile of these

transportation routes (and railways) are exposed to the impacts of a potential HAZMAT event. Structures, people, and natural resources located outside of a one mile buffer of these routes are also at risk of exposure.

Assets and people that are located within one mile of an industrial or commercial fixed site are also at risk of exposure to the impacts of a HAZMAT release.

Potential Losses


HAZMAT related events occur throughout Weld County every year. The intensity and magnitude of these incidents depend on weather conditions, the location of the event, the time of day, and the process by which the materials are released. Was it raining when the event happened? Were the hazardous materials being transported by rail when they were released or were they at a fixed facility? Did the spill happen during rush hour traffic or in the middle of the night? All of these considerations matter when determining the risk and potential damages associated with a HAZMAT incident.

HAZMAT events have the potential to threaten lives and disrupt business activity. Moreover, HAZMAT incidents can cause serious environmental contamination to air, ground, and water sources.

Severe Storm (Hail, Lightning, Winter Storm)

Hail

According to the best available data there are no reported injuries, deaths, property, or crop damage in the Town of Hudson. There have been 7 hail event reported within the town limits and several hail events that occurred close to the town limits. Based on the historic data showing hazardous impacts on the town, there is a great potential for hail events to occur at any given time.



Lightning

According to the best available data, no injuries, deaths, or crop damage have occurred within the Town of Hudson due to Lightning. There have been 2 recorded lightning incidents between 1999 and 2000 within the town limits, causing \$100,000 in property damage. Based on the historic data showing hazardous impacts on the town, there is a great potential for Lightning to occur at any given time.

Winter Storm

According to the best available data there are no reported injuries, deaths, property damage, or crop damage in the Town of Hudson from winter storm events. There have been four winter storm events reported within the town limits and several winter storm events that occurred less than one mile from the town limits. Based on historic data showing hazardous impacts on the town, there is a great potential for winter storm events to occur at any given time.

Inventory Exposed

All assets located in the Town of Hudson can be considered at risk from severe storms. This includes 2,569 people, or 100% of the town's population, and all buildings and infrastructure within the town. Damages primarily occur as a result of high winds, lightning strikes, hail, snow-loading, and flooding. Most



structures, including the town's critical facilities, should be able to provide adequate protection from hail but the structures could suffer broken windows and dented exteriors. Those facilities with back-up generators are better equipped to handle severe weather situation should the power go out.

Potential Losses


Severe storms affect the entire planning area of the Town of Hudson including all above-ground structures and infrastructure. Although losses to structures are typically minimal and covered by insurance, there can be impacts with lost time, maintenance costs, and contents within structures. A timely forecast may not be able to mitigate the property loss, but could reduce the casualties and associated injuries.

It appears possible to forecast these extreme events with some skill, but further research needs to be done to test the existing hypothesis about the interaction between the convective storm and its environment that produces the extensive swath of high winds. Severe storms will remain a highly likely occurrence for the Town of Hudson. It is likely that lightning and hail will also be experienced in the area due to such storms.

Straight-Line Winds and Tornadoes

According to the best available data, no injuries, deaths, or crop damages have been recorded within the Town of Hudson due to tornadoes. There have been 2 tornadoes reported within the town limits and multiple tornadoes very close to the borders of the town limits. On June 8, 1958 a tornado was reported within the town limits that caused \$3,000 in property damage. Tornadoes will remain a highly likely occurrence for the Town of Hudson.

According to the best available data, no injuries, deaths, or damages have been recorded within the Town of Hudson due to straight-line winds. There have been 2 high wind events recorded within the town limits. Straight-line winds remain a highly likely occurrence for Hudson.



Inventory Exposed

All assets located in the Town of Hudson can be considered at risk from straight-line winds and tornadoes. This includes 2,569 people, or 100% of the town's population, and all buildings and structures within the County. Most structures, including the town's critical facilities, should be able to withstand and provide adequate protection from severe wind and tornadoes. Those facilities with back-up generators should be fully equipped to handle severe wind and tornado events should the power go out.

Potential Losses

Generally, straight-line wind events and tornadoes destroy private, commercial, and public property. Additional costs stem from debris removal, maintenance, repair, and response. Indirect costs include loss of industrial and commercial productivity as a result of damage to infrastructure, facilities, or interruption of services. Because no specific, community-wide loss estimation exists for wind and tornado hazards, potential losses are related to structure value. The building value of the structures in this area amounts to roughly \$105,540,448. Potential losses could be substantial.

Capabilities Assessment

The capability assessment examines the ability of the Town of Hudson to implement and manage the comprehensive mitigation strategy laid out in this Plan. The strengths, weaknesses, and resources of the community are identified here as a means for evaluating and maintaining effective and appropriate management of the town’s hazard mitigation program.

Local Personnel

The ability of a community to implement a comprehensive mitigation strategy depends, in part, on available resources, including people and staff. The table below outlines the City’s capabilities as they relate to key personnel.

Land Use Planning and Codes

Local land use plans and building codes are tremendous tools for evaluating local policies related to hazard mitigation and risk reduction. Additionally, comprehensive master plans, capital improvement plans, stormwater plans and zoning ordinances all present opportunities for enhanced local capabilities. Hudson is in the process of updating their Comprehensive Land Use Plan, their All-Hazards Emergency Operations Plan, and their Crisis Action Guide. The town’s new Fire Chief, Ken Gabrielson (Hudson Fire Protection District), and new Public Safety Director, Brent Flot (eventual Town Marshal), will be participating in the EOP / CAG / Hazard Mitigation Plan Update projects, along with the town’s utility partners.



Building codes are one tool that communities use to enhance public safety. For example, they can increase structural integrity, mitigate structure fires, and provide benefits in relation to natural hazard avoidance. In Colorado, land use regulations and building codes are typically implemented at the local level. Even without a statewide mandate, most counties and many municipalities have enacted regulations and codes. The Town of Hudson has adopted a local building code requirement, demonstrating their understanding of the benefits codes provide, including reduced exposure to hazards.

Plan Maintenance and Implementation

Hudson has developed a Plan Maintenance and Implementation Strategy outlining their method and schedule for keeping the plan current. The Implementation Strategy below also includes a discussion of how Hudson will continue public participation in the plan maintenance process.

Integrating Hazard Mitigation into Local Planning

The Town of Hudson did not integrate the 2009 HMP into other local planning mechanisms. The table below lists the specific integration strategies identified by Hudson based on the mitigation actions listed in this plan.

- Demonstration that there has been proactively offered an opportunity for participation in the planning process by all community stakeholders (examples of participation include relevant




involvement in any planning process, attending meetings, contributing research, data, or other information, commenting on drafts of the plan, etc.);

In the last session the Colorado legislature passed House Bill 1073, requiring continuing education for electricians. The bill also requires that inspectors must ensure that electricians doing work in the Town have met the requirements. The Town is required to adopt and post, including a website posting, the procedures that will be used to ensure compliance.

Resolution No. 16-15 adopts a policy that conforms to the new law. Under the policy the Town will do the following:

1. Ensure that an electrical contractor's license number is listed on permits that include electrical work.
2. Check with the Colorado Department of Regulatory Agencies website to ensure that the license is active.
3. Require notification of the Town if the electrician changes during a project.
4. The Town's inspector "may" ask an electrician overseeing the work to verify compliance.

Resolution No. 16-15 with the one-page policy statement and a copy of HB 16-1073 are attached. Also attached is an email from the Town's building official, Barry Kramer, explaining the requirement in more detail.

EXHIBIT A

Electrician License Contemporaneous Review Guidelines

PURPOSE

These guidelines outline the process the Town of Hudson uses to meet the requirements for contemporaneous review of electrician licensure, as set forth in C.R.S. § 12-23-116(10).

SCOPE

These guidelines apply to all building code inspections performed by the Town of Hudson or on its behalf by SAFEbuilt, Hudson's private building inspection partner. These guidelines only apply to those building permits requiring a licensed electrician, as prescribed by relevant state and local law. All other permit applications will not be required to meet the requirements of these guidelines.

PROCESS

1. Upon receipt of a building permit application for an electrical only permit, the Town of Hudson will first review the application to ensure the electrician and his/her state electrical and contractor's license number is listed on the permit. If an electrician is not listed at the time of application, it must be listed before issuance or the permit application will not be processed.
2. The Town of Hudson will then verify that the listed electrician has an active electrician's license. The preferred method of verification will be the online license search on the website of the Colorado Department of Regulatory Agencies (<https://www.colorado.gov/dora/licensing/Lookup/LicenseLookup.aspx>). If an active license is not verified for the listed electrician, the permit application will not be processed until such time as the information can be verified.
3. If the electrician performing / overseeing the electrical work on the building project changes at any time during construction, the permit applicant must notify the Town of Hudson of the new electrician's name and license number. The Town of Hudson will then perform an online license verification as described in Step #2 above. If an active license is not verified for the newly-listed electrician, the Town of Hudson can require all electrical work to be stopped on the project until a verifiably-licensed electrician is listed.
4. At the time of inspection, the building inspector may at the inspector's discretion request to verify the identity of the electrician performing / overseeing the electrical work on the project, with the intention of verifying compliance with state licensing requirements and the issued permit application. If the inspector is unable to verify the identity of the electrician who performed the electrical work, the inspector may "fail" the inspection at the inspector's discretion until verification is completed.

Joe

It affects us in a couple ways. First part of the bill regulates how electricians maintain their licenses which for our commercial inspectors licensing is required in order to perform inspections. We'll stay in compliance with that as part of our requirements to provide services. Nothing for the town to do on that portion.

On the second part about a contemporaneous review. Inspectors in the field have checked for licensure of contractors in the past now the state is looking for a policy to be posted on jurisdictions websites stating how that will be administered and how compliance to the statutes for licensure will be checked prior or at permit issuance.

Checking licenses at permit application or issuance will be something town staff will need to do simply by making sure an electrician is listed on the application then checking the state data base to make sure their current. I can show staff how to do that and will set up something to come out and show them.

Homeowners are still exempt from licensing when doing work on their own residence in which they reside, this does not include landlords or someone working only to flip or sell a home.

Definitions from the state electrical board.

Homeowner

The lawful owner of a property or residence not intended for sale or for rent and generally not open to the public.

Homeowner permit

A permit available to homeowners who personally perform work on their own property. Homeowner permits are NOT available for property that is for rent, resale, or generally open to the public.

A homeowner may install electrical work at their residence and must obtain a permit with the State Electrical Board or the local building department prior to starting the electrical work. A homeowner may do their own wiring if:

* The work is personally performed by the homeowner and the property is not for sale, resale, or rent and is not generally open to the public.

CONCERNING THE QUALIFICATIONS OF LICENSED ELECTRICIANS.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 12-23-106, **amend** (4) (d) as follows:

12-23-106. License requirements - rules - repeal. (4) (d) (I) (A) ~~Error after January 1, 2011~~, BEFORE JUNE 1, 2017, the department shall not renew a license unless the applicant has demonstrated competency through an assessment of competency, which may be performed by private entities in accordance with rules promulgated by the board.

(B) THIS SUBPARAGRAPH (I) IS REPEALED, EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2018.

Capital letters indicate new material added to existing statutes; dashes through words indicate deletions from existing statutes and such material not part of act.

(II) ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2018, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL NOT RENEW OR REINSTATE A LICENSE UNLESS THE APPLICANT HAS COMPLETED TWENTY-FOUR HOURS OF CONTINUING EDUCATION SINCE THE DATE OF ISSUANCE OF THE APPLICANT'S INITIAL LICENSE OR, IF THE APPLICANT'S LICENSE WAS RENEWED OR REINSTATED, THE MOST RECENT RENEWAL OR REINSTATEMENT.

~~(H)~~ (III) ON OR BEFORE APRIL 1, 2017, the board, in collaboration with established industry training programs and industry representatives, shall adopt rules establishing continuing competency standards. The rules shall include, but shall not be limited to, the following elements:

~~(A)~~ Assessment of the knowledge and skills required to renew a license;

~~(B)~~ The methods to obtain the required knowledge and skills; and

~~(C)~~ The EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS AND STANDARDS, WHICH REQUIREMENTS AND STANDARDS MUST INCLUDE COURSE WORK RELATED TO THE NATIONAL ELECTRICAL CODE, INCLUDING CORE COMPETENCIES AS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD. A RENEWAL OR REINSTATEMENT LICENSE APPLICANT SHALL FURNISH OR CAUSE TO BE FURNISHED TO THE BOARD, IN A FORM AND MANNER REQUIRED BY THE BOARD, documentation necessary to demonstrate compliance with this subparagraph ~~(H)~~ (III) AND RULES PROMULGATED PURSUANT TO THIS SUBPARAGRAPH (III). TO ENSURE CONSUMER PROTECTION, THE BOARD'S RULES MAY INCLUDE AUDIT STANDARDS FOR LICENSEE COMPLIANCE WITH CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS AND REQUIREMENTS PERTAINING TO THE TESTING OF LICENSEES BY THE CONTINUING EDUCATION VENDOR.

~~(H)~~ The assessment required by sub-subparagraph (A) of subparagraph (H) of this paragraph (d) shall provide sufficient information to each licensee to allow the licensee to address any areas of deficiency. If the licensee fails to demonstrate competency, the license may be renewed if the licensee provides evidence that the licensee has complied with the requirements of the continuing competency program.


SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 12-23-116, amend (10) as follows:

12-23-116. Inspection - application - standard - rules - repeal.

(10) An inspector performing an inspection for the state, an incorporated town or city, a county, a city and county, or a qualified state institution of higher education may verify compliance with ~~any provision of this article;~~ **and HOWEVER, FOR EACH PROJECT, INSPECTIONS PERFORMED BY THE STATE, AN INCORPORATED TOWN OR CITY, A COUNTY, A CITY AND COUNTY, OR A QUALIFIED STATE INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION MUST INCLUDE A CONTEMPORANEOUS REVIEW TO ENSURE THAT THE SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS OF SECTIONS 12-23-105 AND 12-23-110.5 HAVE BEEN MET. A CONTEMPORANEOUS REVIEW MAY INCLUDE A FULL OR PARTIAL REVIEW OF THE ELECTRICIANS AND APPRENTICES WORKING ON A JOB SITE BEING INSPECTED. TO ENSURE THAT ENFORCEMENT IS CONSISTENT, TIMELY, AND EFFICIENT, EACH ENTITY, INCLUDING THE STATE, AS DESCRIBED IN THIS SUBSECTION (10), SHALL DEVELOP STANDARD PROCEDURES TO ADVISE ITS INSPECTORS HOW TO CONDUCT A CONTEMPORANEOUS REVIEW. EACH ENTITY'S STANDARD PROCEDURES NEED NOT REQUIRE A CONTEMPORANEOUS REVIEW FOR EACH AND EVERY INSPECTION OF A PROJECT, BUT THE PROCEDURES MUST PRESERVE AN INSPECTOR'S ABILITY TO VERIFY COMPLIANCE WITH SECTIONS 12-23-105 AND 12-23-110.5 AT ANY TIME. EACH ENTITY, INCLUDING THE STATE, SHALL POST ITS CURRENT PROCEDURES REGARDING CONTEMPORANEOUS REVIEWS IN A PROMINENT LOCATION ON ITS PUBLIC WEBSITE. AN INSPECTOR may file a complaint with the board for a ANY violation of this article.**

SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,





Subject: Street Bond Refinancing

Attachments

I mentioned to the Council at a previous meeting that I was looking into the possibility of saving some of the interest on the street bonds by refinancing at a lower rate. After talking to our finance consultant, Lorraine Trotter, our bond underwriter, Alan Matlosz, and our bond counsel, Dee Wisor, I recommend that we proceed with the refinancing.

As of the end of this year our principal balances on the street bonds would be as follows:

General Obligation Bonds	\$1,695,000
Sales Tax Revenue Bonds	\$1,400,000

There are expenses involved in the refinance that would be rolled into the new issue. The “call date” on the bonds is in late 2017, so refinancing at this time would be an “Advance” refinance, and would require payment of a “reoffering premium.” There will also be fees for the bond underwriter and bond counsel.

One option we may have is to roll both issues into a single general obligation bond. Our advisors will be exploring that possibility and any additional savings it might provide.

Attached is an engagement letter from George K. Baum for underwriter services. I’ll be getting one from bond counsel and will present it if I have it prior to Wednesday’s meeting. It is likely a good idea to keep this process moving ahead in order to avoid possible interest rate increases in the near future.

Also attached are sample refinancing analyses that Alan Matlosz provided as an indicator of the possible savings that this effort might produce.

UNDERWRITER ENGAGEMENT AGREEMENT

This Underwriter Engagement Agreement (“Agreement”) is made this day of , 2016 by and between **THE TOWN OF HUDSON** (“Issuer”), and **GEORGE K. BAUM & COMPANY**, located at 1400 Wewatta Street Suite 800 Denver, CO 80202 (“GKB”).

PURPOSE: The Issuer has identified a specific capital project, the issuance of Bonds to refinance existing bonds and to potentially fund new capital needs (the “Project”), which may result in the issuance of bonds, notes, refunding bonds and the use of other financial instruments (the “Transaction”). The Issuer deems it in its best interest to engage and retain GKB, a qualified investment banking firm, to provide certain services for or related to the Transaction, including but not limited to the following: (1) provide underwriting services, including the preparation of supporting data, underwriting bonds and other financial instruments at the lowest practicable interest rate, and assist in obtaining credit enhancement and ratings; or, (2) to serve as structuring agent for privately placed bonds; and/or (3) to serve as structuring agent for loans.

CONSIDERATION: Consideration for this Agreement includes the services, compensation, and mutual exchange of promises of the parties specified herein.

SPECIFIC PROVISIONS

The provisions of the above “Purpose” section shall be material and binding to this Agreement.

1. **GKB’s Obligations.** GKB shall provide the Issuer with investment banking services for and related to the Transaction, including the analysis of cost factors relative to the underwriting or private placement of bonds and other instruments relative to the financing of the Project, and:
 - A. Work with the Issuer and others as directed by the Issuer, concerning the issuance of debt securities for the Transaction;
 - B. Attend all meetings and be available to the Issuer, its Administration and other agents for consultation and conference at times and places mutually agreed upon throughout the Transaction proceedings;
 - C. Assist the Issuer in the preparation, coordination and distribution of printed matter for or related to the Transaction, including circulars, press releases, special mailings, etc., in order to acquaint the Issuer’s population with the benefits and financial considerations of the Transaction;
 - D. Prepare financial information and schedules necessary to acquaint the Issuer with the benefits of the various forms of financing for or related to the Transaction, including interest rates, marketing factors, credit enhancement, and user fee costs;
 - E. Advise the Issuer on underwriting or the direct placement of its bonds for or related to the Transaction, including but not limited to (1) providing advice as to the structure, timing, terms and other similar matters concerning the Transaction; (2) preparation of ratings strategies and presentations related to the issuance being

underwritten; (3) preparation for and assistance with “road shows” and investor discussions related to the issuance being underwritten; (4) advice regarding retail order periods and institutional marketing; (5) assistance in the preparation of the preliminary and final official statements for the municipal securities; (6) assistance with the closing of the issuance of the municipal securities, including negotiation and discussion with respect to all documents, certificates, and opinions need for such closing; (7) coordination with respect to obtaining CUSIP numbers and registration of the issue of municipal securities with the book-entry only system of the Depository Trust Company; (8) preparation of post-sale reports for such municipal securities; (9) structuring of refunding escrow cash flow requirements necessary to provide for the refunding or defeasance of an issue of municipal securities; (10) providing regular updates of bond market conditions, analysis of financial or accounting factors of importance to the proper placement of the bonds for or related to the Transaction, recommendations regarding appropriate bond maturity schedules, call features, registration provisions, paying agency and trusteeship responsibility, user rate covenants, any special sinking fund provisions, flow of tax or user fee funds, interest rate limitations, or bond delivery procedures, for or related to the Transaction;

- F. Make recommendations as to the exact amount of the bonds to be issued for and related to the Transaction, maturity schedules, redemption features and provisions, and other related items, in order to formulate the most attractive and appealing investment package to the purchasers of the bonds which will result in the maximum benefit and minimum net effective interest cost to the Issuer;
- G. Assist in the preparation of a credit presentation for bond rating agencies and bond insurance companies;
- H. Collect, format, and prepare information, in cooperation with the Issuer for a Preliminary Official Statement or a Private Placement Memorandum, as appropriate, related contracts or agreements, and bond proceedings for or related to the Transaction, all of which shall be appropriately executed and satisfactory to the Issuer;
- I. Engage in pre-marketing activities to announce and promote the sale of Project bonds for and related to the Transaction;
- J. Distribute the Preliminary Official Statement to potential investors;
- K. Provide for a pricing conference call, during which the related pricing levels for the Project bonds will be established prior to the offering of a purchase contract agreement;
- L. Arrange for closing and delivery of the Project bonds;
- M. Prior to the offering of any of the Project bonds or debt securities for sale, provide an estimate to the Issuer of all underwriting or structuring agent profits and

interest rates, and upon completion of the sale, provide the Issuer with a detailed accounting of actual total profits and expenses;

- N. It is expressly understood and agreed that this Agreement does not intend, and is not under any circumstances to be construed as requiring GKB to perform services which may constitute the practice of law. GKB is employed in an expert financial capacity only;
- O. It is expressly understood and agreed that GKB will not limit its work to the steps outlined but will extend its services as necessary to ensure that all appropriate underwriting services for and related to the Transaction are provided to or on behalf of the Issuer in a professional and satisfactory manner;
- P. Our firm hereby states that it does not knowingly employ or contract with illegal aliens and that we have participated in or have attempted to participate in the E-Verify Program or Department Program (formerly known as the Basic Pilot Program) (as defined in §8-17.5-101, C.R.S.) in order to verify that we do not employ any illegal aliens.

2. **Issuer's Obligations.** The Issuer's obligations shall include the following:

- A. Retain GKB as its investment banker to act as bond underwriter, structuring agent or placement agent for and related to the Transaction;
- B. Cooperate with GKB in the proper development of the Transaction and provide all pertinent information needed to support successfully underwritten or privately placed bonds or loan(s) on behalf of the Issuer;
- C. Employ a nationally recognized firm of bond attorneys and utilize the services of the Issuer's attorney;
- D. Pay for, or arrange for the payment of, all costs of legal advice, printed matter (informational brochures, bond printing, Preliminary and Final Official Statements), advertising, engineering, bond ratings, bond insurance premium, required audits and other professional services;
- E. Pay GKB, or arrange for the payment to GKB of an underwriting fee, structuring agent fee or placement agent fee for and related to the Transaction, to be mutually agreed upon, based upon a percentage of the par amount of the bonds or loan(s) For the Transaction, the fee to George K. Baum & Company of 1.00% shall calculated as a percentage of the greater of the principal amount or the proceeds of the Transaction. This fee will be paid only at the successful closing of the Transaction

3. **Term.** The term of this Agreement shall commence on _____, 2016, and shall expire on the completion of the Transaction, subject to the termination provisions in Section 4 below.
4. **Termination.** The Issuer, at its sole discretion, may terminate this Agreement at any time by providing a written notice of termination to GKB. At the termination of this Agreement, the Issuer shall pay GKB such compensation earned to the date of such termination, which payment shall be in full satisfaction of all claims against the Issuer under this Agreement.
5. **Execution.** This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts and together such counterparts will be deemed an original.

Supplemental Disclosures
For
New Issues of Municipal Securities**

The Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board (“MSRB”) issued an interpretive notice (“Notice”) relating to Rule G-17, effective August 2, 2012. The Notice requires that Underwriters must provide certain additional disclosures to Issuers of municipal securities as part of the dealer’s fair dealing obligations under Rule G-17 when acting as an Underwriter for a negotiated underwriting of an Issuer’s new issue of municipal securities.

George K. Baum & Company’s Role as Underwriter

- (1) MSRB Rule G-17 requires the Underwriter to deal fairly at all times with both municipal issuers and investors.
- (2) One of the Underwriter’s primary roles will be to purchase bond issues with a view to distribution in an arm’s-length commercial transaction with the Issuer, and the Underwriter has and will have financial and other interests that differ from the Issuer’s interests.
- (3) Unlike a municipal advisor, the Underwriter does not have a fiduciary duty to the Issuer under the federal securities laws. The Underwriter, therefore, is not required by federal law to act in the Issuer’s best interests without regard to the Underwriter’s own financial or other interests.
- (4) The Underwriter has a duty to purchase securities from the Issuer at a fair and reasonable price, but must balance that duty with its duty to sell bond issues to investors at prices that are fair and reasonable.
- (5) For the Issuer’s bond issues that the Underwriter underwrites, the Underwriter will review the Issuer’s official statement, in accordance with, and as part of, the Underwriter’s responsibilities to investors under the federal securities laws, as applied to the facts and circumstances of the transaction.

The Underwriter also must not recommend that the Issuer not retain a municipal advisor.

The Underwriter’s Compensation

The Underwriter’s compensation for serving as the underwriter for the Issuer’s bond issuances will be contingent on the closing of the transaction and at least a portion of that compensation will be based on the size of the bond issue. The rules of the MSRB require the Underwriter to inform the Issuer that compensation that is contingent on the closing of a transaction or the size of a transaction presents a conflict of interest, because it may cause the Underwriter to recommend a transaction that it is unnecessary or to recommend that the size of the transaction be larger than is necessary.

Bond Issuances Present Risks to the Issuer

As with any bond issue, the Issuer’s obligation to pay principal and interest will be a contractual obligation that will require the Issuer to make these payments no matter what budget constraints the Issuer encounters. Furthermore, to the extent that the Issuer agrees in a bond issue to rate covenants, additional bond tests or other financial covenants, these may constrain the Issuer’s ability to operate and to issue additional debt, and if the Issuer does not comply with these covenants, they can result in a default under a bond issue. Depending on the terms of a bond issue, if the Issuer fails to make a payment of principal or interest or if the Issuer otherwise fails

to comply with its covenants under the bond issue, the trustee may have the right to accelerate all of the payment of principal on the bond issue, which means that the Issuer may be required to pay all of the principal of the bond issue at that time.

George K. Baum & Company will provide additional disclosures to the Issuer from time to time, as may be required by the provisions of MSRB Rule G-17.
